For the past year at YACWA, we've maintained a focus on consolidation: to clarify what we do well and what we need to do better and provide an excellent service that our members want and need.

We must ensure that YACWA continues to be relevant to young people and is considered an effective advocate for issues of importance to young people. We want to reflect the values of respect, equity, integrity and the celebration of diversity and be considered a professional and valuable partner to other organisations.

In this report, you'll find that two major projects, the Strengthening School Communities Project and the third phase of Roofs for Youth were both completed in the past year. These projects resulted in YACWA having a presence in almost every region of WA.

We also set out to increase our public profile – you'll find our media coverage in the Media Pick Ups section of this report. An article about the use of 'warning cards' by a national chain of shopping centres to prohibit young people due to anti-social behaviour evoked this response from a 76-year-old reader:

"The problem with the Youth Affairs Council is that they are only concerned about the youth."

This comment proved that an important part of our mission — to help members of the community understand the work we do — had succeeded.

Another issue that created heated community debate was the use of drug disposal bins at music festivals. We received strong support for the trial bins and will continue to lobby for their use. We invited the Commissioner of Police to meet our members to discuss this and other issues of concern to our members. As a result of these discussions, a Youth Summit to address such issues is planned for the 2009/10 financial year.

Thank you to the board for their guidance, enthusiasm and support; the team of YACWA staff who bring their commitment and passion to the organisation; and to all of our members, who provide the inspiration for the work we do. In the past financial year, YACWA has moved to a position of relative financial security. In doing so, we have met one of our most important strategic objectives: to achieve a sustainable financial position. The outstanding work of our staff must be commended.

Key highlights from the past year include:

Our Annual General Meeting (AGM) and Board activities

Our AGM was held during the Fairground conference. The number of young people elected to the board exceeded the mandated requirement of two young people, which points to a vibrant and healthy future. Thank you to all board members for your support and commitment to YACWA.

Home is Where My Heart Is

We have continued to focus on homelessness, with the continuation of the Home is Where My Heart Is photographic exhibition. This event shows the photographic works of young photographers and homeless young people. This year's exhibition was extremely well attended by young people, people from the youth sector, politicians and some of Perth's social identities.

Youth Week and Youth Awards

During Youth Week, a group of our YACWA representatives held a candlelight vigil at Parliament House. The group included a number of politicians, which helped improve our visibility among state politicians. YACWA was also recognised as a finalist at the Youth Awards which was attended by some Board members.

In addition to these achievements, we now have a presence on the Edith Cowan Universities Social Science Consultative Committee

We've stayed on-track with our 2007 to 2010 plan and will enter the next triennial planning phase early next year. As we move into a new decade, we'll continue to focus on the financial viability of YACWA. So far, introducing 'fee for service' consultancy and training has helped to ensure our income base is not solely a State Government grant.

We also need to carefully define our role in relation to the youth sector and advocate more directly for young people. We have the expertise and the will to do this and look forward to working in a collaborative and supportive way with our corporate and community

Our focus on homelessness over the past year culminated in a partnership with Propel Youth Arts WA to launch the Home Is Where My Heart Is photography project.

The exhibition, showcasing the photographic works of young photographers and homeless young people, was held at Ginger's Garage in Northbridge. This venue was chosen over a traditional gallery setting to intentionally alienate the audience, keeping them aware of their surroundings and the issue of homelessness.

More than 250 people from the youth and arts sectors attended the exhibition, including Members of Parliament, high profile 'Perthonalities' and members of the local arts community. The event was officially opened by John Hyde MLA and featured addresses from young photographer Brad Serls.

Profits from print sales were donated to the services which supported the young people to participate. Most of those services purchased digital cameras for the young people so they could continue to pursue their interest in photography.

Thank you to our photographers: James Campbell, Kate Namestnik, Cate Gormisall, Brad Serls and Nicole Norelli, and our young participants Shannon, Tut, Sarah, Java, Bernie, Simone, Samantha and Shorty who were engaged through Joondalup Youth Support Service, Passages Resource Centre, Wanslea and Perth Inner City Youth Services.

Our Strengthening School Communities project was developed to prevent students from disengaging with their schooling. The project investigated ways to improve early intervention partnerships between communities Resource Manual (CD ROM & Hardcopy)

- Creating the Culture: Building Partnerships: Building partnerships between the youth and community sector and Government secondary schools (Booklet)
- Strengthening School Communities (Final Report)

The project, which was supported by Lotterywest, allowed us to identify a number of gaps in the existing partnerships between schools and relevant agencies. These gaps ranged from a lack of support services for students during major transitions (e.g. primary to secondary school), to the difficulties youth agencies experienced when trying to engage with schools to talk about sexuality and drug harm-minimisation.

PROJECT PROFILE

Our aim with the Roofs for Youth project is to develop a useful program to help young people obtain and maintain a private rental. This year these elements, which form phase three of the project, were completed successfully:

The *Roofs for Youth* CD ROM

The manual was reviewed, rewritten and transferred to CD ROM, with new interactive activities for both workers and young people. New sections in the program include Moving Out, When Things Go Wrong and Young Persons' Tenancy Booklets.

The *Roofs for Youth* education program

Services can submit each young person's progress as they complete stages of the new *Roofs for Youth* program. This information will be tracked on our partner, Tenants Advice Service Western Australia (TASWA) training database, to maintain current information on each young person's capabilities and automatically produce certificates when they complete the program.

The successful completion of this project means the Western Australian youth sector will soon have easy access to *Roofs for Youth* information and resources, which they can use to support the young people they are working with.

Thank you to those who participated in this project, including our partner TASWA and funding body, the Department of Families, Housing, Community Services and Indigenous Affairs (FaHCSIA).

We coordinated the Fairground conference to encourage social inclusion through the continued development of fairness and equity for young people across metropolitan and regional areas of WA.

The conference was supported by our generous sponsors which are listed at the en of this Annual Report.

Throughout the conference, our 220 delegates including a strong contingent of young people who were able to learn from one another and more importantly, learn about the work being undertaken around the State to improve the lives of young people A number of abstract presentations were scheduled around conference themes (My Life, My Home and My Community) and covered topics including:

- Young carers
- Social inclusion
- Housing and homelessness
- Young leaders in remote areas
- Sexuality and gender
- Youth arts

I am pleased to present the financial Statements for YACWA for the Financial year ending 30 June 2009.

As a result of the careful management of our funds and the business the staff has been able to generate for YACWA, the Balance Sheet has shown an improvement in excess of 50% in Net Assets compared with a year earlier. This is reflected largely in an increase in Cash Reserves of a little less than \$30,000.

One oversight in the Budget and the consequences of struggling to manage the GST systems for YACWA has meant that the Profit & Loss position for the year shows a small deficit of \$4947 (just over 1%) rather than an almost break-even outcome of about \$1000 in surplus. The GST matters are in process of being rectified with the Australian Tax Office.

The following items from the Sectional Accounts are worthy of note:

- The Fairground Conference returned a small surplus of nearly \$5000.
- YACWA has secured a two-year contract for a project with the Department of Health.
- The provision of a small vehicle for the EO as part of the Salary Package
 has incurred Fringe Benefit Tax liabilities that we not calculated before.
 Since we have not been able to secure an exemption from FBT, these have
 been calculated for the past three years of the life of the car and settled
 with the ATO.
- Income from Training by YACWA staff has increased ten-fold this year on the previous year.

I believe that the performance of YACWA in the financial area reflects a really good outcome and augers well for the future.

AUDIT REPORT

Scope

I have audited the financial report, being a special purpose financial report comprising the Income and Expenditure Statement and Statement of Assets and Liabilities of the Youth Affairs Council of WA (Inc.) for the financial year ended 30 June 2009.

The Council's Committee of Management is responsible for the financial report and has determined that the accounting policies used and described in Note 1 to the financial statements are appropriate to meet the needs of the members. The financial report has been prepared for the distribution to members for the purpose of fulfilling the Committee's accountability requirements under the Constitution. I disclaim any assumption of responsibility for any reliance on this report or on the financial report to which it relates to any person other than members, or for any purpose other than that for which it was prepared.

My audit has been conducted in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards to provide reasonable assurance whether the financial report is free of material misstatement. My procedures included examination, on a test basis, of evidence supporting the amounts and the other disclosures in the financial report, and the evaluation of accounting policies and significant accounting estimates. These procedures have been undertaken to form an opinion whether, in all material respects, the financial report is presented fairly in accordance with the accounting policies described in Note 1 to the financial statements. These policies do not require the application of all Australian Accounting Standards and other mandatory professional requirements.

The audit opinion expressed in this report has been formed on the above basis.

In my opinion the financial report presents fairly in accordance with the accounting policies described in Note 1 to the financial statements, the financial position of the Youth Affairs Council of WA (inc.) as at 30 June 2009 and the results of its operations for the year then ended.
