

		 Clare presented the Financial Statements for YACWA for the period ending June 2023. A copy of the report was made available at the registration desk. 	
		• YACWA's financial position continues to strengthen, with increased income from \$2,152,608 in the previous 2022 financial year to \$2,787,096 in this financial reporting period.	
		• YACWA's main source of income was consistent with the prior year, being the Department of Communities, Department of Health and Lotterywest funding with a significant boost from the fair.ground. Conference which had an income of \$249, 568.	
		• Lotterywest support of YACWA's expansion to regional WA and Youth Sector Small Grants Scheme had generated opportunities for State-wide advocacy and organisational growth.	
		• Expenditure for the 2022-2023 financial year was \$2,686,811 with most of the expenditure spent on employee costs, sector-wide events and activities. YACWA's Advisory arm continues to provide valuable services to organisations including Carers WA, Ruah Services, Mercycare and continues to provide advice to Local Governments across the State.	
		• YACWA's Statement of Profit and Loss denotes finishing the 2023-2023 financial year with a surplus of \$100,285.	
		 Extended thanks to YACWA's CEO Sandy McKiernan, Finance Manager Gaurav Singh and the Finance Committee for their diligent management of YACWA's finances.

		They have advocated for young people's experiences and showing up at every opportunity to do so; across local and national consultations, events such as Catalyst Multicultural Youth Summits and regular MYAN WA networking and advocacy forums. They have given their time to attend and represent MYAN WA in their capacity as Chair at networking, reference and advisory group settings. Ensuring refugee and migrant young people are always on the agenda.	
		This nominee is a really strong advocate, and a consistent one, for refugee and migrant young people. Going above and beyond, and balancing the demands of their frontline role to do this work and try and to achieve positive outcomes for young people. They are always open to working in collaboration and partnering with others. Their advocacy for refugee and migrant young people and their various challenges in the education system, as a frontline worker with a wealth of experience (including making shifts and changes at a systemic level) has added considerable depth and value to the advocacy work of MYAN WA and YACWA.
