FROM OUR EXECUTIVE OFFIGER LISA LASCHON

YACWA is an ever changing beast. When I took the position as Executive Officer in September 2007 it seemed as if every day, every week presented an entirely new challenge, new idea, different people and different issues. I imagined that this was my 'steep learning curve' and that any moment I would feel as if I could predict what the next week would bring – it hasn't happened yet. That is the real highlight of working with and for young people and the organisations and youth workers that support them – the only constant is change.

Changes in the past financial year included the successful application for funding from the Department of Health to run a two year research project that has the working title of the 'YEP' (Youth Educating Peers) Project, managed by Rebecca Walker and supported by Olivia Knowles. We welcomed Emma Breheny as our Policy and Communications Officer and Craig Comrie took a short contract with the Australian Youth Affairs Coalition (AYAC) as their Senior Policy Officer.

We also welcomed to our Board David Scaife and Sandra Spadanuda at our 2009 AGM and welcomed back Jane Forward and Amanda Murray. Our Board members for 2009/2010 included Brian Wooller (Chairperson re-elected at 09 AGM), Keelia Fitzpatrick (Vice Chair), Philippa Boldy, Richard Newnham, and Kate Carter and Katie Thompson (Treasurer), who were both invited to join the Board. The YACWA Board is predominantly a 'young' one with a broad range of skills and areas of interest and I thank them for their generous support of YACWA, the staff and myself, and their commitment to this organisation

We were delighted by the federal government decision to refund the national youth peak, the Australian Youth Affairs Coalition, with an old friend, Meredith Turnbull, in the role of Establishment Director. Her nationwide tour provided an opportunity for us to provide feedback about the work and challenges we experience here in the West and I was very pleased to have become the Interim Chairperson of AYAC's Policy Advisory Committee, which gave me the opportunity to meet with peak members and organisations from around Australia which I found very interesting.

As 2010 would be YACWA's 30th anniversary we felt that it was important to undertake a major organisational development project which was funded by Lotterywest and has included the development of a strategic business plan for the future and also an accommodation needs assessment project. For both projects we were assisted by Creating Communities and we are pleased to present the outcomes of both of these projects to you at our Annual General Meeting and in this Annual Report.

FROM OUR SHAIPPERSON BRIAN ROOLLER



The year 2009-2010 has been one of consolidation for YACWA. We have been able to develop a broader income base which reduces our dependence on the core funding received from the Office of Youth. This has involved consultancy and training and managing a number of contracted programs.

In July 2009 we secured funding from the Department of Health (Western Australia) to undertake a youth peer education, sexually transmitted infection and blood borne virus research project. This is a two year funded project and involves a number of peer education models in six youth sector agencies.

We have also been able to get funding from Lotterywest to contract Creating Communities to assist us in developing our strategic plan and provide an accommodation needs assessment.

A successful Home Is Where My Heart Is exhibition was held and was well-attended by an amazing cross section of the population: young people, workers from the youth sector, politicians and interested members of the public. It was a clear demonstration of how the "arts" has the capacity to draw people together in a common appreciation - on this occasion it was the creativity and skills of young people.

We have continued with comment on and formal responses to matters of public policy, notably making strong representation on the proposed "stop and search legislation". The Board has met with the Minister for

Youth, the Shadow Minister, and National Party and Greens members, the Honourable Mia Davies and the Honourable Alison Xamon, respectively.

During this year we lost Craig Comrie to the national peak body AYAC. This was a good opportunity for Craig and will prove to be invaluable to YACWA in the longer term. The staff have all contributed well in their support of Lisa in what has been a very successful year. I would like to thank Lisa, our Executive Officer, for her leadership and her support to the Board, and extend a thank you to all staff who not only present themselves in a professional and positive manner but also produce quality work.

The Board, as was mentioned at the last AGM, now has two positions mandated for a young person. This has led the way to a Board that is now predominantly made up of young people, with an even gender balance and a set of wide ranging skills and abilities reflecting what is needed in a contemporary Board. We have been fortunate in this respect and have most bases covered. The Board is also representative of the youth work field with four of its members directly employed in that sector. While we have a young Board it is one which understands governance and discharges this duty in a professional and clear manner. I would like to thank all Board members for their support and clarity of thought throughout the past year; it has been a pleasure and a rewarding experience for me.

2010-2015

With the successful receipt of an Organisational Development Grant from Lotterywest we were able to contract Creating Communities to work with the Board and staff to develop a Strategic Business Plan which we are pleased to present to our members.

The creation of a dedicated role for an Organisational Development Officer (as held by Craig Comrie between August 2008 and November 2009) gave us the opportunity to road test some new ideas about how to better engage and serve our members. During this period we presented forums, coffee cup conversations, training and increased our profile with public events such as our candlelight vigils and protests.

Members were surveyed about these events and whether they found our regular publications such as the Youth Sector Update (YSU) and Interface of value. These results were used to determine the strategic business plan and opportunities for the future.

As you will see in the Strategic Business Plan it is essential that YACWA finds a way to provide an effective network of information dissemination and training for the youth sector, particularly for our rural and remote members who are often unable to access quality training and feel enormously isolated in their challenging work.

With the Strategic Business Plan as the focus of our work members are encouraged to provide information and opportunities for networks and training requirements when requested in the near future.

My Voice Matters (MVM) was launched in 2009. Aside from our core work MVM enables YACWA to undertake discrete projects, consultations and contracts and has allowed us to present the Home Is Where My heart Is project in 2009 as well as a myriad of projects as listed in 'Committees, Speaking Engagements and Events' in this Annual Report. YACWA is interested to work with experts with specific skills and has developed a pool of people whom are called upon to facilitate these services thereby adding to YACWA's profile and reputation of providing relevant and valued services.

PEERS PROJECT JULY 2007 - JULY 2011

The YEP Project is a two-year action research project that aims to establish an ongoing presence of sexually transmitted infection (STI) and blood-borne virus (BBV) information and education in the WA youth sector by development and implementation of effective and sustainable youth peer education strategies.

YEP, was born out of, and based on, several layers of evidence:

- Current epidemiology young people experience the highest number of newly acquired notifications for Chlamydia, Gonorrhea and Hepatitis C, with Chlamydia having risen three-fold in the last decade
- 2007 WA state-wide youth consultation (Sorenson & Brown, 2007) – young people learn about sexual health from their peers; young people want sexual health education that is interactive, discussion-focused, and placed in a context that reflects the complexity of their real-life experiences (drugs and alcohol, relationships, consent, etc.)
- A strong international evidence base for STI/BBV youth peer education strategies (visit www.yacwa.org.au for a comprehensive literature review) and skills-based education
- Evidence of the synergy between the youth worker role and the context-based sexual health and BBV education being called for by the evidence (self-esteem, assertiveness, relationships, peer pressure, drug and alcohol etc)

The YEP Project has four key objectives that centre on capacity building of the youth sector and sustainability of program implementation with young people:

- Increased confidence and competence of youth workers to develop, implement and evaluate STI/BBV peer education programs
- Increased organisational capacity of trial agencies to respond to young people's STI/BBV needs
- Increased capacity of young people (knowledge, confidence, self-esteem, skills) to adopt healthy STI/BBV behaviours and attitudes and to influence their peers to do the same
- 4. Mobilisation of the youth sector and media to increase the relevance of, and action relating to, STI/BBV issues for young people

YEP (Youth Educating Peers) Project July 2009 – July 2011 continued...

In order to achieve our objectives, YACWA has developed numerous partnerships, both with a dedicated reference group, and with six agencies who have committed to 'trialing' the development and implementation of STI/BBV peer education programs with their young people. These agencies are;

- Bullsbrook Girls Group
- Midland PCYC
- City of Swan Hyper Series
- Mission Australia Youth Accommodation Support Service
- The Cool Room Youth Centre
- Dungeon Youth Centre/Metropolitan Migrant Resource Centre

There are approximately 20 youth workers involved over the six projects, who since March 2010, have committed extensive time and energy to being trained, participating in monthly planning and evaluation meetings, and designing and delivering their programs with young people.

Anecdotally, preliminary outcomes with young people and youth workers have been extremely positive. It appears that the peer group structure for sexual health and BBV education facilitates a safe, confidential learning space where young people feel comfortable to express themselves without judgement. Key components of the programs which appear to be supporting their success are: flexibility to talk about whatever issues come up in the group; ongoing and meaningful youth participation and ownership; respect and confidentiality; and fostering social connectedness with peers and staff.

Looking forward to July 2011 (the project completion date), the YEP Project will be presenting six case studies of STI/BBV peer education programs, with recommendations to the WA Youth Sector on how to best develop, implement and evaluate STI/BBV peer-based programs.

2009

After an overwhelmingly positive response to "Home Is Where My Heart Is" in its inaugural year, YACWA and Propel Youth Arts WA once again collaborated to deliver a project of exceptional quality and impact in 2009 despite the project going unfunded.

Once again, several young homeless people were partnered with talented emerging photographers who guided them through the process of using digital SLR cameras to produce high quality, artistic photographs of what 'home' means to them. True to the project's original theme, there was an emphasis on the positive aspects of what home can be – a safe place where loved ones are, an object you're attached to or a place where you belong, as opposed to the gritty image of rough sleepers that dominates perceptions of homelessness.

Home Is Where My Heart Is 2009 saw an even greater diversity of photographs produced by the young people, proving that 'home' can take many shapes and forms. While the images themselves were all stunning, it was the stories behind each young person's photographs that elevated them to something more than just something to hang on the wall.

The exhibition was held during National Homeless Person's Week, with the photographs displayed at The Bank gallery space on William Street in Northbridge. This space upheld the project's desire to use unexpected inner-city locations to display the work of the young people in order to keep the audience mindful of the issue being addressed.

Opening night saw The Bank brimming over with more than 350 people drawn from the arts community, the youth sector,



politics, business and those who were keen to support a cause and appreciate some stunning photographs. The exhibition was opened by the Honourable Lynn McLaren MLC, with photographer Nicole Norelli and young participant Tash also speaking. Sales were in excess of \$7,000 throughout the course of the exhibition.

Following on from the success of the exhibition, the photographs from Home is Where My Heart Is were displayed at the Asia-Pacific Conference on Child Abuse and Neglect (APCCAN), held in Perth in November 2009. Delegates from across the region were exposed to the stories and aspirations of the ten participating homeless young people, transforming the statistics relating to child protection and homelessness into reality. A further \$1,600 was made from sales at APCCAN.

The profits that were donated to the services went mostly towards the purchase of cameras to be used by other young people engaged with each service. Several of the young people from both 2008 and 2009 have gone on to study photography courses after their interest was piqued by the project.

The photographers and young participants, as well as the agencies that support them, must be acknowledged, as well as those who contributed their time and resources to the project.

I am pleased to present the audited financial statements for the Youth Affairs Council of Western Australia for the financial year ending 30 June 2010.

I acknowledge Mr. John Clapton and his work as Treasurer and thank him for his commitment before I was co-opted to the Board in November 2009.

Through the successful application for project funding from the Department of Health for the Youth Educating Peers project (July 2009 – July 2011), YACWA effectively doubled its income and was able to employ 1.6 full time equivalent staff.

Salary and wages costs were kept within budget with the leave without pay of one member of staff and other costs were, the members will be pleased to learn, kept within budget.

Members will note that there was income generated from Fairground 2010 registrations gathered prior to the end of the financial year however all costs were incurred in the next financial year and a true outcome of Fairground 2010 will be reflected in the 2010/11 Annual Report.

Independent income was incurred through two contracts through the My Voice Matters suite of services.

With responsible governance, management, and staff of the Youth Affairs Council of Western Australia I am pleased to report that the audited reports reflects the continued financial viability of this organisation.
